About Our School

Granite Falls High School in the 18/19 school year served 473 students in grades 9-12. It is a compre-hensive high school offering College in the High School, Running Start (Everett Community College) and Career and Technical Education (CTE) classes, as well as providing outstanding basic education classes. Through this wide variety of student choices, athletics, and school activities, students are pre-pared for the work place of the future.

The High School has 1 administrator, .5 CTE Director, 1 Assistant Principal/Athletic director, 30 certificated, 2 counselors and 16 support staff. We are very proud to be recognized again this year as a School of Distinction. In addition, the US News High School Rankings for 2013 has rated our high school 48th in the state, 3rd in the county.

Survey Results

An educational reform bill passed by the Washington State Legislature in 2010 required that school districts seek feedback from parents and community members and summarize the responses in the annual performance reports. The survey was conducted in November 2018 and provided the following results: The District scored highest (based on a five point scale) in parent-teacher partnerships, positive culture, student preparation, and positive image. Our Learning Improvement Plan

2018-2019 Goals

District Goal #1: Quality Learning.

- Increase the passing rate of all students by 10% from the 2017/18 school year.
- New Algebra 2 class to help struggling students gain 3rd year math credit. Encouraged students to come in before or after school for help and use the activity bus. Encouraged students to set up study groups.
- Teachers passed out progress reports and call or email parents of students who are earning a D or F in class.
- Used shortened Friday early release days as a tool for students that have multiple missing assignments.
- Met with students that were below 60% in regular individual conferences.
- Science Department took class time throughout the week to sit down one on one with students' that were falling or in danger of failing courses.
- Encouraged PE students to properly dress and present in class in order to give the students the best opportunity to be successful in class and receive a passing grade. Offered make up work for excused absences. Health has a class goal of 90% turn in rate on all assignments.
- Fine Arts worked w/kids with a C or lower in their classes to help students maintain or improve their GPA.
- Changed classes and updated curriculum to help decrease the failure rate. Added new classes to peak students' interest.
- Connect early and frequently w/students who were failing utilizing a Data Mining Tool in Skyward. Every twenty days the counseling department discovered in "real time": all of the students who were failing one or more classes and met individually w/ the students to develop a plan of action. Freshman information was shared w/ ELL instructors and additional support was provided.

District Goal #2: Positive Image. Increase positive behavior recognition for attendance, academics and behavior during the 2018/2019 school year.

- Gave students certificates for recognition for a variety of behavior/skills/accomplishments. Recognize top performers on the board after every test and quiz.
- Teachers posted students work in the classroom and hallway and recognized students in each class for behavior, attendance, and academics at least once a quarter.
- Staff worked to create a Hall of Fame Board for the Arts in the Science wing-honoring students... Above and beyond the Student of the Week or Student of the Year Awards.
- Worked with leadership to recognize students from out classes at least once a semester.
- Re-established the printing and distribution of first and second semester Honor Roll certificates as well as perfect attendance certificates.

District Goal #3: College- and Career-

Ready. Opportunities for every student to visit a college or career site for a field trip by the end of the 2017/2018 school year.

Math- Explored the opportunity to have students visit UW math day and local business that kids have an interest in.

English- As a department, they discovered multiple opportunities for students in all grades to participate in some type of field trip related to their classes. For example, participate in World Language Day at the UW, tour a manufacturing plant with juniors, visit a local newspaper, or attend a local poetry slam or play. Teachers will look into each of these opportunities to determine dates and costs.

Social Studies- Teachers exposed students to the opportunity of a field trip/hosting professionals per teacher to get their students exposed to more work or college experiences.

Science- took a field trip to UW science departments and local ecological field trips.

Art- Explored field trip opportunities for students to broaden the student's understanding of the Fine Arts.

C.T.E- They were able to expose students to work/college experience.

Counseling- Provided opportunities for students to visit a college or career site. Displayed college visit information/fliers on the window looking out into the commons area. Additionally they worked with other departments to identify available dates for college visits and worked with them to organize field trips. Organize field trips to EvCC for a tour of the campus, completed testing requirements, and met with financial aid specialists. The tour included a tour of EvCC's Advanced Manufacturing AMTEC program. They also worked with Cathy Wagner and Crossroads to share transportation to college campuses, work site, etc.



Graduation Rate The 2018-19 graduation rate was 88.0% (rates determined by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction for federal reporting purposes).

State Test Scores (Grades 10, 11)

In the spring of 2018, students took the new Smarter Balanced Assessment (SBA) which is aligned with the State Common Core Standards in English Language Arts (ELA) and math. Since the SBA is new and more rigorous than previous assessments, OSPI predicted state passing rates for ELA and math to be around 35%.



Condition and Use of Our Building

Granite Falls High School opened in December of 2007 thanks to the community support of a bond issue passed in 2006. In 2012 a Solar panel was installed on the Southwest facing roof. This panel supplies clean energy to the building and reduces the carbon footprint. New energy efficient lighting was also added in 2013 which reduced energy costs and improved indoor and outdoor lighting. Granite Falls High School is a model for eco-friendly school design while providing state of the art teaching and learning spaces. In 2018, Granite Falls High School opened a brand new stadium just in time for the fall sports season. Safety and Security of all is an imperative goal at the high school and to this end we have installed a brand new updated security system at the high school for the 2018-2019 school year.
