

## Survey Results

An educational reform bill passed by the Washington State Legislature in 2010 required that school district seek feedback from parents and community members and summarize the responses in the annual performance reports. The survey was conducted in November 2015 and provided the following results: The District scored highest (based on a five point scale) in school safety, positive district image, positive district culture, and teacher-parent communication. The District scored average or below grade level in college and career readiness for students, communication with faculty, families, Granite Falls Fire Safety Presentation and the community, as well as engaging instruction in the classroom. 

The average daily attendance for the 2014-15 school years through May was 94%.

#### **State Test Scores (Grade 4)**

In the spring of 2015, students took the new Smarter Balanced Assessment (SBA) which is aligned with the State Common Core Standards in English Language Arts (ELA) and math. Since the SBA is new and more rigorous than previous assessments, OSPI predicted state passing rates for ELA and math to be around 35%.



### Condition and Use of Our Building

Mountain Way Elementary was built in 1989 and serves grades K-5. The school has 24 regular classrooms, one (two room) portable, music room, library, special education instructional rooms, and a gym/cafeteria for multipurpose activities. Our building has undergone a number of recent upgrades, including new lighting, plumbing, food service equipment, carpeting and painting. Mountain Way Elementary is open for the public use including classes, youth activities, and community activities and meetings.
