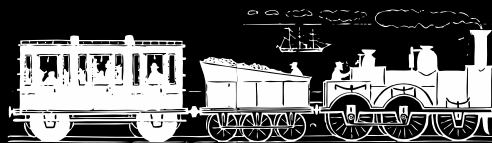

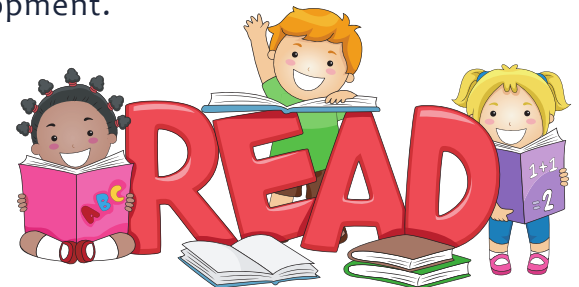
- A) Enhanced brain activity and increased development of the ability to focus

MARY THORS 4TH GRADE CLASS - WRITING A STORY OF THEIR OWN

Books and a tragedy brought a story to reality for many 4th graders at Monte Cristo Elementary. Some of the best stories are not always found in a book and many fourth-grade students in Mrs. Thor's class at Monte Cristo Elementary discovered this when they heard of another elementary school in their state that had many of their books destroyed by a flood. They decided to host a book drive to collect books for the Sumas Elementary School which were victims of major flooding throughout their community. Sumas suffered from two back-to-back severe floods that affected several families and businesses in the area. The elementary school had 2-3 feet of water in their school building where many books and supplies were destroyed by floodwater.



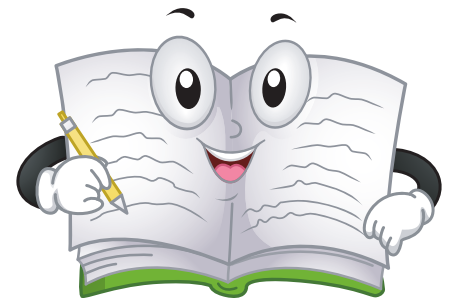
"It would be devastating to see good stories get lost. My mom would have been in tears," said Tessa Houghton, a 4th grader in Mrs. Thors' class.

After hearing about the tragedy students, staff and the community at Mountain Way Elementary, Monte Cristo Elementary and the Boys and Girls Club came together to round up over 3,000 books.

"My family donated at least 20 nonfiction books," said Ryder Isdell.



Mary Thor's 4th graders took on the task of collecting the donated books and keeping track of the numbers of books. Starting November 23rd students made signs to hang around the school, collected and counted books each day. There were math lessons completed through math with numbers and students got to partner up when working on the poster projects and collecting books. The posters were hung throughout Monte Cristo Elementary as well as Mountain Way Elementary. Several books would pour in every day. "Sometimes there would be huge piles," shared fourth-grader, Malina Neuman.



Casey Mummy shared that he is sorry about their loss of books and hopes the donation will help.

Did you miss Kindergarten Round-Up? Will your child be 5 years of age on or before August 31, 2022?

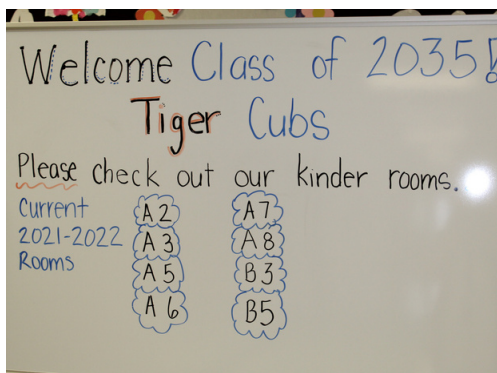

ANNUAL COMMUNITY SURVEY RESULTS

An educational reform bill passed by the Washington state Legislature in 2010 required that school districts seek feedback from parents and community members and summarize the responses in the annual performance reports. The survey was conducted in November 2021 and provided the following results:



The district scored highest (based on a five-point scale) in Safety: commitment to safe facilities/classrooms and following safety procedures; Embracing Technology: where the district provides technology that supports student growth, instructional integration and operational efficiency; Positive Image: celebrating student success, working closely with community partners, countering perceptions & stereotypes; Positive Culture: welcoming and encouraging environment that celebrates student success at all levels.

The district scored the lowest in Innovative Instruction: providing advanced, differentiated, rigorous and inspiring instruction; Student Preparation: helping students transition between grades, schools and/or post-graduation; Parent/Teacher Partnerships: informing and collaborative communication regarding student progress; Communication: that is informing, intentional, encouraging and collaborative.
